Meet the last of our 2022 Ambassadors up close

Each newsletter we have featured our most recent Ambassadors who have joined our network. In this edition, we would like to welcome the final Ambassadors from the 2022 selection; The McDonagh Family

August Ambassadors: McDonagh Family (Co. Mayo)

The McDonagh family run an organic mixed farm in county Mayo. They keep cows, sheep, pigs, ducks and hens. They grow 2 acres of organic root vegetables which are sold locally. They have planted over 8 acres of mixed

broadleaf forestry on the land. The mature hedgerows and field boundaries are left to grow naturally and serve as important habitats for birds and other wildlife. They continue to plant trees on the farm every year. Relying on very few external inputs, the family have built a farm that is highly self-sufficient and resilient to environmental and economic shocks. The grazing paddocks contain a diverse mix of grasses and herbs. The animals provide manure which is a crucial source of fertility for the vegetable beds. They use green manures to naturally increase the nitrogen content of the soil where the vegetables are grown. Eamonn has worked with draft horses and more recently with oxen to work the land. The draft animals are used to carry out many of the farm tasks – from harvesting trees from the wooded part of the farm to harrowing vegetable beds. The McDonagh's have hosted farm walks on the farm for Slow Food Ireland and the Small Growers Network. *"This farm is a testament to what can be achieved when a love of nature is coupled with a passion for local, sustainable food and when diversification is championed over specialisation."*

The Hare's Corner - creating wildlife ponds

We are delighted to that we were able to offer funding to our ambassadors and those that had been through The Horse's Mouth programme in 2022 the opportunity to build a wildlife pond. So far 34 substantial ponds have been build this year and last year with funding through The Hare's Corner project. Wildlife ponds on farms are one of quickest ways to invite nature to your farm. Nature's Calendar this Autumn - observations & actions

As we arrive into the celtic Autumn, knapweed and scabious flowers are common at this time of year, as well as harebells. Complementing the purples and blues are an array of yellows – including bedstraws, ragwort and goldenrod. The latter two flowers are deceptively similar, though one is far more benign than the other! Delaying the mowing of hay meadows into August will allow some of the taller herbs to spread their seed, as well as providing food for insects and birds. Meanwhile brambles, blackthorn, crab apple, hawthorn and other shrubs will all soon be weighed down by their autumn loads. These berries will be important food sources for birds such as thrushes, blackbirds, starlings and smaller birds going into late Autumn
